



## **Student Board Member Job Description**

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### **About CANIE**

CANIE recognizes that the international education sector is a key contributor to greenhouse gas emissions and therefore we bear responsibility to take climate action. The organization, founded in 2020 continues to work to empower and mobilize the stakeholders of international education to address the climate emergency with urgent and decisive action. CANIE members believe that international educators should take on climate issues as a shared responsibility and ensure that climate solutions advance justice, equity and human rights. ### **Job Description**

The student board member is a voluntary role with a 2-year position with an expected time commitment of between 2-4 hours per week. This is entirely based on their level of engagement with a CANIE chapter, working groups, and other projects. The person in this role would be expected to offer their own and what they interpret as the student perspective for relevant decision-making, event planning, and other initiatives.

### **Responsibilities**

- Serve as an advocate for CANIE's mission amongst student peers and personal networks.
- As capacity and project development allow, consider the steps necessary to begin a student working group.
- Work with necessary connections internal and external to CANIE to increase student outreach.
- Volunteer with projects and working groups that pertain to interests and as time allows.
- Within the first six months of the appointment, meet with all Global Board members.

- Become familiar with CANIE's mission and resources to become an engaged and informed member.
- Act as the point of contact for new student members.
- Participate in Global Board meetings.
- Participate in relevant chapter meetings and events.
